PROGRAM NOTES

Cant de les estrelles

Premiered in 1911, Granados wrote the Cant de les estrelles (Song of the Stars) for an unusual grouping of Three Choirs, Piano, and Organ. Granados, a pianist by trade, played the daunting piano part himself. Granados died in 1916, and the piece was not performed again. The manuscript was thought lost in a fire. After long last, and after a protracted legal battle over the rights to the found manuscript, the Cant de les estrelles was re-premiered in 2007 nearly a century after its first hearing. The work only has a few documented performances in America, and this is the Arkansas premiere.

Ah! Eternal immensity of space! Madness and fever of love, delirium which we've never known!

A Pale Blue Dot

The "Pale Blue Dot" is a photograph of Earth taken on Feb 14, 1990, by the Voyager 1 space probe from a distance of 3.7 billion miles. In the photo, Earth's size is a third of a pixel, just a tiny dot against the vastness of space, with three bands of sunlight streaming across the image reflected by the camera's lens. Voyager 1 has since left the solar system and the influence of the sun's gravity. Voyager 1 is now nearly 16 billion miles from earth in interstellar space, travelling away from us at 35 degrees

north of the ecliptic plane, at a speed of 38,210 mph. It will travel for approximately 40,000 years before the sun is no longer the closest star to its position. This photo gave a new perspective to the petty differences in our greater humanity, and this work explores that perspective through the lens of Voyager 1, as it looks back on this fleck of rock captured in a beam of light. This is the premiere performance of the work.
