PROGRAM NOTES

Dr. Cristina Ballatori, is the newly appointed Assistant Professor of Flute at the University of Arkansas Department of Music. She has performed across the United States, Europe and Latin America as a recitalist, soloist, chamber and orchestral musician. Recent performance highlights include featured guest appearances at the Festivales Internationales de Flautistas in Lima, Peru, and World Flutes Festival in Mendoza, Argentina, concerts in venues such as the Atelier Concert Series in Paris, France, and artist residencies in Spain, Costa Rica, and Mexico. An active chamber musician, Ballatori is a member of the Semplice Duo with pianist Kevin Chance and the Whitewater Chamber Players.

Concertino for Flute and Orchestra, Op. 107. Cécile Chaminade composed the Concertino (with piano accompaniment) in 1902 for flautist Paul Taffanei, her colleague at the Paris Conservatoire. It was presented as a musical gift, but soon became a required examination piece for flute students at the Conservatoire. A version with orchestra followed almost immediately, and was premiered in London, with her friend Marguerite de Forest Anderson as soloist. It remains an audience and flautist favorite.

Symphony #9, D. 944 (The Great C Major). The problems associated with numbering late Schubert Symphonies have not been resolved. Originally thought to be #7 in line, "The Great C Major" came to be known as #9, after the discovery of the unfinished symphony in B Minor (#8), which leaves an imaginary symphony to take up the #7 mantle. (The Leipzig Gewandhaus Orchestra, which originally premiered the work, refers to it as #10!). The adjective "great" has two possible meanings: as a means of differentiating this symphony from #6, "The Little C Major," and as an indication of its 'heavenly length" (Schumann's phrase). In fact, there's an old joke: Schubert wrote only two symphonies, the "Unfinished" and the "Unending." Suffice it to say, the Great C Major is as delightful as it is complete.
