Biographies

Visiting Artists

Jennifer Amox is the Department Chair and Associate Professor of Music Theory at Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls, Texas. Prior to her appointment at MSU-Texas, Jennifer served as the Coordinator of Music Theory and Associate Professor of Flute at Henderson State University. In addition to teaching at the collegiate level, she has taught band and choir at elementary and secondary levels in the North Little Rock (AR) and Pasadena (TX) school districts. Jennifer holds degrees from the University of Memphis (DMA), Stephen F. Austin State University (MM), and Henderson State University (BM). She was featured on Phillip Schroeder's 2011 release, Passage through a Dream and was a frequent contributor to Flute Talk magazine prior to its closing in 2021.

Dr. Conor Bell enjoys a varied career as an educator, orchestral musician, and chamber musician. He currently serves as Assistant Professor of Bassoon and Music Theory at Middle Tennessee State University, previously he taught at Auburn University. Conor is particularly passionate about championing new music and expanding the bassoon's repertoire by commissioning new pieces and creating arrangements of existing works for the bassoon or his chamber ensembles. Conor has served as principal bassoon of the Owensboro Symphony Orchestra in Kentucky since 2016 and is also an active chamber musician, currently performing with the Elicio Winds—a flute, oboe, bassoon trio—which has performed across the country at various conferences, as well as many local venues focused on community outreach.

Dr. JoDee Davis is Professor of Trombone at the UMKC Conservatory. She plays extra trombone with the Kansas City Symphony, has served on the faculties of Kent State University and Eastern Washington University, and has been a member of the Spokane Symphony and the Santa Fe Opera Orchestra. She received the UMKC Conservatory's Muriel McBrien Kauffman Award for Excellence in Teaching (2015) and Service (2021). Davis holds the Doctor of Music degree from Indiana University, and the Master of Music and Bachelor of Music degrees from the University of Northern Iowa. She has two solo recordings on Albany Records: In the Moment (2001) and The Voices of Air (2020).

Andrew DeBoer is the Associate Professor of Clarinet and Department Head of Music and Theatre at the University of Arkansas — Fort Smith. While performing with an array of orchestras in the region, he is principal clarinetist with the Fort Smith Symphony. DeBoer can be heard on several solo albums along with the critically-acclaimed album of Florence Price Symphonies by the Fort Smith Symphony. DeBoer earned his DMA under Robert Spring at Arizona State University.

Russian pianist **Tatiana Gorbunova** is an active soloist, teacher, chamber musician, and adjudicator. Recent performances include solo, chamber, lecture-recitals, and masterclasses across the United States and Mexico. As a chamber musician, Gorbunova has performed with members of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, Sichuan Symphony Orchestra, Handel and Haydn Society, Mobile Symphony Orchestra, Tallahassee Symphony Orchestra, and Nizhny Novgorod Philharmonic orchestras. Gorbunova was appointed in the fall of 2018 to the piano faculty of Texas A&M International University in Laredo, Texas.

Dr. Nicole Gillotti joined the TAMIU faculty in 2019 as Assistant Professor of Trumpet where she teaches courses in Applied Trumpet, Brass Ensemble, and Brass Methods. In addition to teaching, Gillotti is an active performer. She co-founded Hint of Lime Brass, a brass trio which has performed at various universities, conferences, and performance venues to premiere new music for brass trio. In Texas, she currently performs with the McKinney Philharmonic and Victoria Symphony. She recently completed recording her debut solo CD, Many Faces, which will release in June 2023. Gillotti has also performed with many professional ensembles including the Illinois State University Faculty Brass Quintet, Transit Brass Octet, Illinois Consortium Quintet, Champaign-Urbana Symphony, Millikin-Decatur Symphony, and Berks Sinfonietta. Gillotti has performed at conferences, festivals, and competitions throughout the United States and Europe including the International Women's Brass Conference, Orvieto Musica, and the International Trumpet Guild Conference. She competed as a semi-finalist in the undergraduate and graduate solo divisions for the National Trumpet Competition in 2014, 2015, and 2016; as well as the Ensemble Division in 2018. Gillotti received a B.S. in Music Education from Indiana University of Pennsylvania, M.M. in Trumpet Performance from Illinois State University, and D.M.A. in Trumpet Performance and Literature from University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign.

Dr. Sarah V. Hetrick (she/her) serves as an Assistant Professor of Music at Texas A&M International University, where she teaches applied saxophone, woodwind methods, and music history. Sarah is an active solo and chamber musician and has been invited to teach and perform at Duquesne University, Colorado State University, and the University of Iowa, among others. Sarah's research covers topics related to gender and the sexualization of the saxophone and she has lectured throughout the United States on her paper, "He puts the pep in the party": Gender and the Saxophone in Early-Twentieth-Century American Advertisements.

Ginny Hudson is Senior Instructor of Music-Flute at the University of Arkansas-Fort Smith. She plays with the Symphony of Northwest Arkansas (SoNA) and serves as a SoNA Mentor in the symphony's educational outreach program. She also tours regularly as a chamber musician as a part of the Mockingbird Quartet, the South Winds, and the Apple Blossom Trio. Ms. Hudson holds a BA from Arkansas Tech University and an MM from the Longy School of Music. Her principal teachers were Robert Willoughby and Karen Futterer. She is a doctoral candidate at Southern Arkansas University.

Gretchen Renshaw James enjoys a multifaceted career as a conductor, tuba and euphonium performer, and arranger. She is the Nancy and Craig Wood Odyssey Associate Professor of Music at Hendrix College in Conway, Arkansas, President of the Arkansas College Band Directors Association, and a published arranger with Potenza Music and Tuba-Euphonium Press. Gretchen completed a D.M.A. in Tuba Performance and M.M. in Wind/Orchestral Conducting at Michigan State University, where she was a University Distinguished Fellow. Previously, she earned degrees in Euphonium Performance from the University of Arkansas and Penn State University. Gretchen is a Yamaha Performing Artist.

Pianist Dr. **Albina Khaliapova** is a winner of international competitions and festivals in Europe and the United States, including the International Competition for Young Performers 21st Century Art (Ukraine), International Competition Music without Limits (Lithuania), Young Musician International Competition Citta di Barletta (Italy), and International Keyboard Oddysiad 2015 (United States). Born into a musical family, Albina developed an acute musical sensitivity and a natural aptitude for the piano. By the age of seven, she was already admitted to the Secondary Special Musical College, where she won her first international competition and made her solo debut with an orchestra. Albina Khaliapova holds DMA in piano performance from Louisiana State University, MM from the University of South Florida, and a BM from Ufa State Academy of Arts.

Dr. **Heather Killmeyer** serves as Associate Professor of Double Reeds at East Tennessee State University. An active performer, Heather has explored her diverse skills and experience in a wide range of orchestral, chamber, and solo repertoire. She was the oboist and artistic director of Dada Cabaret, an experimental chamber ensemble blending eclectic contemporary art music with spoken narrative and elements of theatre. An advocate for contemporary music, she has participated in numerous commissions and premieres of new works for oboe.

Dr. Kristin Leitterman defies modern convention as a solo artist of oboe and voice, bringing exciting and unusual programs to audiences. Currently, she is the Assistant Professor of Oboe at Arkansas State University, as well as Director of the Lucarelli Oboe Master Class. As a researcher, Dr. Leitterman has interests in the life and works of Mary Chandler and Marie Grandval, as well as the musical autograph album of Gustave Vogt. She holds degrees from the City University of New York's Graduate Center, the Hartt School, New England Conservatory, and the University of Missouri Kansas City Conservatory of Music.

Eric Millard is the Assistant Professor of Trumpet at UNC Charlotte and director of the Charlotte Youth Trumpet Ensemble. Millard is a member of the Palisade Trumpet Collective and solo cornetist with the North Carolina Brass Band. As an orchestral musician, he has performed with the Charlotte Symphony, Charlotte Ballet, South Carolina Philharmonic, Asheville Symphony, Opera Carolina, Boise Philharmonic, and Pensacola Symphony, among others and was formerly the third trumpet of the Tallahassee Symphony. As a soloist, Millard has won prizes at prestigious competitions such as the International Trumpet Guild Solo Competition, National Trumpet Competition, King's Peak International Music Competition, the American Prize, Music Teachers National Association Solo Competition, and the U.S. Army Band National Collegiate Solo Competition and has won concerto competitions at both of his alma maters. Millard's fond interest in chamber music led him to win prizes at the National Trumpet Competition (ensemble division), McCauley Chamber Ensemble Competition, and the Calvin Smith Brass Quintet Competition. Millard received his Doctorate and Master's Degrees in Trumpet Performance from Florida State University and received a Bachelor's Degree in Trumpet Performance from the University of Kentucky. Millard's primary instructors were Dr. Christopher Moore, Vince DiMartino, Robert Sullivan, Mark Clodfelter, and Dr. William Stowman. Dr. Millard also serves as an Executive Board Member for the National Trumpet Competition and as the Book Reviews Column Editor for the International Trumpet Guild Journal. Eric Millard is an S.E. Shires performing artist.

Dr. **Jennifer Oliverio** is a celebrated cornet player who holds the positions of principal cornet with the Fountain City Brass Band and Assistant Professor of Music at Missouri Western State University. Jen is an avid supporter of new music having commissioned and premiered solo works for her premiere solo album Enigma. Her work on Enigma was nominated for the 2021 4barsrest Album of the Year, received a silver medal in the Global Music Awards in 2022, and named her as a semi-finalist for the American Prize instrumental category in 2023. Jen has performed as an extra with the Kansas City Symphony, Kansas City Ballet, and is a founder of the Trilogy Brass Trio.

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Lisa Perry is the Assistant Professor of Clarinet at East Tennessee State University. Dr. Perry has appeared with the North Carolina Symphony Orchestra, the Symphony of the Mountains, and has recorded for Minnesota Public Radio (MPR). Dr. Perry earned her doctor of musical arts degree in clarinet performance at the University of Minnesota. She received her master of music degree in clarinet performance at Florida State University and holds a bachelor of music degree in clarinet performance from East Carolina University. Her teachers include Janice Lipson, Michael Cyzewski, Anne Dervin, Christopher Grymes, Frank Kowalsky, and Alexander Fiterstein.

Olivia Phaneuf (She/Her) is an active performer, educator, and arts administrator in Austin, Texas. Olivia maintains an active performing career as a solo and chamber musician and has been invited to perform at schools and festivals across the United States, including the International Saxophone Symposium, Texas A&M International University, TMEA Conference, North American Saxophone Alliance Conference, and more. Olivia frequently performs with her duo partner, Megan Elks in their saxophone duo MOXIE. Along with performing, Olivia has an active private studio in Austin, where she teaches 30+ middle & high school aged saxophonists. This is by far her favorite thing to do! When not teaching or performing Olivia can be found working in the Butler School of Music's performance library as an assistant librarian. Olivia holds a Masters of Music in Saxophone from The University of Texas at Austin, and a Bachelors of Music in Education and Saxophone Performance from The Crane School of Music at SUNY Potsdam. Her primary teachers are Dr. Casey Grev and Dr. Stephen C. Page.

Sara Remoy maintains an active career as a performer, reed maker, as a teacher. In addition to being a member of multiple chamber music ensembles, Sara regularly performs with regional orchestras and owns her own reed business, Beeline Reeds. As a teacher, Sara maintains a private studio of beginning and intermediate bassoon students. Sara holds Bachelor of Music and Master of Music degrees from the University of Arkansas where she studied with Lia Uribe. She is currently pursuing a Doctor of Musical Arts (DMA) in Bassoon Performance and Pedagogy at the University of Iowa studying with Benjamin Coelho.

Kristen Ronning is a horn player currently based in Iowa City, where she is pursuing her D.M.A. at the University of Iowa with Dr. Katy Ambrose. She received her B.M. in Horn Performance from Bowling Green State University and her M.M. in Orchestral Studies from Roosevelt University where she studied with Dr. Andrew Pelletier and Jon Boen respectively. Kristen has performed with various ensembles across the Midwest, including the Ottumwa Symphony Orchestra, Muscatine Symphony Orchestra, Wheaton Municipal Band, and Adrian Symphony Orchestra.

Jenna Sehmann is an oboist and Instructor of Double Reeds and Music History at Southeast Missouri State University. Sarah earned her DM from Florida State University, MM from The Pennsylvania State University, BA from the University of Dayton, and is an alumna of the Pierre Monteux School.

Maddy Tarantelli is the Assistant Professor of Horn at Utah Valley University. Dr. Tarantelli performs regularly with Utah Symphony, and has performed with Ballet West, the Boise Philharmonic, Kansas City Chamber Orchestra, South Dakota Symphony Orchestra, and Fountain City Brass Band. Dr. Tarantelli's education includes a DMA at the University of Missouri-Kansas City, MM from the University of Miami, and a BA in Music Education from Florida Gulf Coast University. Her principal teachers have included Marty Hackleman, Sam Pilafian, and Kirsten Bendixen-Mahoney. Additional major influences include Denise Tryon, Julie Landsman, and Frøydis Ree Wekre.

Dr. **Eduard Teregulov** is an award-winning cellist and educator. Starting his cello journey aged five, he has built a versatile career, performing in a variety of genres and ensembles. Teregulov maintains a consistent performance schedule across the United States as a soloist and chamber musician. In Spring 2022 he performed at Carnegie Hall with the Constantinides New Music Ensemble. Teregulov is a champion of new music. Through his dedication to expanding cello repertoire, he has commissioned and premiered over 20 works for cello, including a cello concerto, and solo and chamber compositions. Six of these are for cello and electronics, the focus of his doctoral research.

Biographies

University of Arkansas Faculty

Dr. Christa Anne Bentley is an Assistant Professor of Musicology at the University of Arkansas. Her research focuses on the politics of music at the intersection of folk and popular song. Her current research examines the confessional songwriting of the 1970s singer-songwriter movement, which is the subject of her first book Feeling Free: The Politics of the Singer-Songwriter Movement in the United States (under contract, University of Michigan Press). This project investigates how singer-songwriters provided a new language of musical protest that intersected with 1970s social movements—including the women's movement, anti-Vietnam War protests, environmentalism, and Black freedom—arguing that within the context of the Nixon Era, the singer-songwriter's confessional songs emerged as a highly politicized form of communication. This research has also led to a published chapter in the Cambridge Companion to the Singer-Songwriter (2016) and a collaboration with the Grammy Museum, California Dreamin': The Sounds of Laurel Canyon (2014).

A native of Oklahoma City and citizen of the Chickasaw Nation, Lauren Nicole Clare began her professional career as a vocalist in 2001. In 2011, she formed an avant-garde collective of classical, alternative, and jazz musicians called The Allie Lauren Project. In 2018, The Allie Lauren Project was nominated for a regional Emmy award by the Heartland Chapter of The National Academy of Television Arts & Sciences. Lauren serves as instructor of voice at the University of Arkansas specializing classical & jazz studies. She also directs the Songwriter's Ensemble and is the founder and director of VOICES vocal jazz ensemble.

Dr. Theresa Delaplain, oboe, is on the faculty at the University of Arkansas. She has performed concerti with the Fort Smith Symphony, the North Arkansas Symphony, the Arkansas Philharmonic, the Thai National Orchestra, and the University of Arkansas University Symphony Orchestra, Wind Ensemble, and Chamber Orchestra. Delaplain serves as Principal Oboist of the Fort Smith Symphony, the Arkansas Philharmonic, and the Symphony of Northwest Arkansas. As a member of the Lyrique Quintette and other chamber ensembles, she has performed across the United States and abroad. Delaplain's solo album, Souvenirs, has been met with critical acclaim.

A member of Exigence and Tactus. Business owner of Green Room Studios, LLC, voice faculty at the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville, AR.

Pianist **Tomoko Kashiwagi** knew from an early age that she truly enjoys interacting with people through music. She is the first recipient of the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Collaborative Piano from the University of Texas at Austin. As the Emily J. McAllister Endowed Associate Professor of Piano and Collaborative Piano at the University of Arkansas, Kashiwagi keeps a busy schedule of performing and teaching, while developing the concert and community engagement programs through the Chamber Music on the Mountain series in Fayetteville, AR as the Artistic Director.

Dr. Hyun Kim is a pianist, vocal coach, and educator who regularly collaborates with singers, instrumentalists, and chamber ensembles. Kim's passion for vocal music has been a significant part of her musical journey. Her opera credits include Aspen Music Festival, Cincinnati Opera, Central City Opera, Kentucky Opera, Opera Colorado, Seattle Opera, Boulder Opera, Bayview Opera, Soo Opera, National Opera in Korea, Festival de Musique de Sully et de Loiret in France, and Lucca Opera Festival in Italy. Wing Lau (she/her) is a music theorist and pianist. Her research interests include rhythm and meter, text-music relationship, performance analysis, and aural skills pedagogy. Her forthcoming article explores how Brahms, composing in the nineteenth century, explores eighteenth-century metric practices in his solo songs. Her most recent research focuses on musical humor. Her forthcoming contribution to the collected volume, Modeling Musical Analysis, explores how compositional and performative distortions of expected intonation and rhythm in musical numbers suggest humor and sarcasm.

Dr. **Ronda Mains** is Professor of Flute and is the retired Chair of the Department of Music at the University of Arkansas. She is Principal Flutist with the Arkansas Philharmonic, and she has played concerti with several orchestras, including the North Arkansas Symphony and the Thai National Orchestra. Mains is a frequent performer with various chamber groups, including the Lyrique Quintette, with whom she has performed nationally and abroad and produced 2 albums. She holds degrees from Boise State University and the University of Oregon.

Nathan Mertens (he/him) currently serves as the Teaching Assistant Professor of Saxophone at the University of Arkansas. As an active soloist and chamber musician, he has performed recitals in Japan, South Korea, Thailand, Croatia, Bolivia, the United Kingdom, and throughout the United States. He has performed as a soloist with orchestras including the Busan Philharmonic Orchestra, Hastings Symphony Orchestra, The University of Texas Symphony Orchestra, and the University of Arkansas Saxophone Ensemble. Mertens is a D'Addario Woodwind Artist, a Yamaha Performing Artist, and a Rousseau Artist Endorser, and performs exclusively on these products.

Flutist **Catalina Ortega**, originally from Colombia is a Flute instructor at the University of Arkansas. She has achieved a career as a soloist, teacher and chamber and orchestral musician. Currently, she performs with the Arkansas Philharmonic Orchestra, Fayetteville Opera, and Manguaré Trio. In addition to teaching, Ms. Ortega has performed in some of the major auditoriums in Colombia as a soloist and touring with chamber music ensembles. She has served Flute/ Piccolo player for the North Arkansas Symphony Orchestra and Flute player of the Medellin Philharmonic Orchestra (Colombia) for several years. She has appeared as a soloist with the University of Arkansas Campus Band.

Pianist **Miroslava Panayotova** has made numerous appearances as recitalist and concerto soloist in the United States, Canada, Bulgaria, Russia, Slovakia, Romania, and Mexico. He holds degrees from the University of Oregon, San Francisco Conservatory of Music, University of Maryland, and Bard College and currently plays a Yanbing Chen cello custom made for Paul Katz in 2017.

Colombian/USA bassoonist **Lia Uribe** is chair and associate professor of music at the University of Arkansas. She maintains an active national and international career as a chamber musician, orchestral player, and artist-teacher. An advocate for diversity/inclusion/representation/balance in the arts, her research is centered on music by and for the historically excluded and underrepresented. She directs Reflextions, a celebration of music, musicians, advocates, and audiences, that fosters creative justice and diversity through opportunities to reflect, learn, grow, change, and teach.

Fernando Valencia is a Percussion Instructor and the Director of the Latin American Music Ensemble at the University of Arkansas. Formerly the principal percussionist of the National Wind Symphony of Colombia, he has also performed with the Bogota Philharmonic, Philharmonic of Southern New Jersey, Arkansas Symphony and currently with The Symphony of Northwest Arkansas, Artosphere Festival Orchestra and the Arkansas Philharmonic, among others. Some of his commercial compositions have been broadcast on television in Norway, Finland, UK and on VHI channel in the US. He has recorded extensively in Colombia and the U.S. and has participated in Latin Grammy nominated and nationally broadcast recordings in the popular and classical arenas. Prof. Valencia is a Gon Bops percussion artist.
